Art found me later in life, like a childhood friend that came knocking on my door after a long hiatus apart. This rediscovery of my love for art happened when I moved to the US from Argentina and had two beautiful boys. My new life was wonderful, but also very busy.

However, one day I realized that I had been doing art every afternoon with my kids, which brought back fond memories and warm feelings from my childhood. That old artistic friend had come back, and this time to stay.

I decided to begin educating myself in classical oil painting at different ateliers. I subsequently fell in love I would paint until the day I died. Becoming a painter was the easy part; becoming an artist was the challenge. There were so many things to learn besides painting! I was not a young student anymore, so it was quite an effort to work on opening back up my imagination while also training rigorously to be able to learn all the different aspects of a career in the arts. But, I was determined to become a full-time artist, and I couldn't be happier with the desition I made more than 12 years ago.

What inspires you the most? Which subject matter are you passionate about in your paintings, and why?


I find inspiration in the details of things, in their characteristics, their stories, their meaning. My current series of rocks is what I am most passionate about. There is something about rocks that fascinates me. These natural wonders have shared their spirit with us since the beginning of time. I started collecting many different types of stones, always looking for their uniqueness in color, design, or texture. By observing them through a camera lens, I discover a whole new world that the naked eye wasn't able to see. I find this process of discovering very inspirational.

Old vintage objects are also a source of attraction for me. I have also collected several over the years. Their story, their time of creation, their meaning intrigues me. It would be interesting to merge these two passions in my future paintings.

My painting process is an evolution from simple to complex. I start with a basic drawing of my subject over a stained cotton canvas. I do that with a very diluted wash of oil paint and turpentine. That provides me with a middle tone ground that is very useful during the blocking layer. At this stage, I am only identifying lights and shadows to form basic shapes. It is at this point that I can quickly identify errors and make changes to the composition. What follows is a slow construction of details layer over layer. Oil paint is so rich and forgiving that it allows me to use a great variety of techniques during that process. Detailing can take months on a big painting, but it is absolutely mesmerizing. I think that's what I love about painting the most; to soul, and definitely for the creative

To be honest, I love and cherish my alone time in the studio, but I keep my balance and feed my need for human interaction with my art classes. I continue to educate myself and still take art classes. Those are my special days to interact with other fellow artists, where we share not only knowledge, but also experiences. Rocks can be bare and simple, or they can be intricate and complex, and hold a lot of meaning depending on the story behind them. I can play with that to express a feeling, tell a story, and show a moment in time a depiction of a meaningful object or simple play with colors. The diversity in the subject also gives me the freedom to explore different painting techniques. Rocks can be rough, edgy, and porous, or they

I certainly hope it is. Contemporary realism has so much to offer to art lovers in that regard. I firmly believe that this is a movement that has a strong future in a world that had once lost interest in all things realistic. The pursuit of beauty in art is a discussion that we can start but never end since it ignites such opposing opinions. However, I do not doubt that beauty in art begins with talented artists, and there are plenty of talented artists in our current culture. We need to learn to recognize them and celebrate them. Magazines like this one are an excellent place to celebrate beautiful art, creativity, and talent.




